Chicago writer Calamity West explored the gaps between truth, perception and reality. Her new play, In the Canyon, is something else: full-throated, pro-choice, pro-women, anti-Trump war cry. He still has room for ambiguity, particularly spiritual, but his purpose is sharply clear. To say that the West is going politics here would be, as they say, that Hamlet goes heavy on poetry. The canyon is divided into five sections: It begins on January 20, 2007, and each subsequent scene moves 10 or 20 years ahead on the same day. In the first part, a young moviegoer named Hope (Liz Sharp) returns to her apartment after an abortion, and comes to realize how awful her boyfriend (played by Andrew Swanson) really is. Ten years later, in the basement of her parents' evangelical church, she watches Donald Trump's inauguration. Ten years later, everything passed full of George Orwell - or, more precisely, a complete Margaret Atwood - and a retroactive ban on abortion meant that Hope faced life on the run. What the play sometimes lacks in the world is the nuances of the characters. Director Ellie Green produces a talented eight-man cast inside a striking marble cube (designed by William Bole and well lit by John Kelly and Helby Arndt), whose surface is poured into the proscenium to frame and contain the action. This mailbox, Evs cinephilia Hopes, has an unnervingly claustrophobic effect. Even in the early scenes, before things go completely wrong, Hope already seems to be caged in. As Hope points out, the world has always been like this - only with less volume. The most internally disturbing moment in the entire show comes when a pregnant woman (Paloma Nozicka) is forced by two men to stand against her will, despite her loud and angry protests.
